Conference Theme

Migration Society - Borders of the Future

As humans continue to exist, migration will persist alongside them. People always moved seeking better opportunities. But the population grows and migration evolves into a multifaceted challenge. While it is getting more accessible for some it becomes harder for others. If we deal with migration the right way, it can not only diversify communities but also lead to economical growth and more social equality.

Migration is a long process and includes a variety of different stages, starting prior to the transit with the decision making. People are motivated by a huge range of reasons, mainly economical ones. Other reasons are wars, political persecution, natural disasters and many more. That stage already requires action because it's not only our job to enable migration for those who want to, but also to ensure no one is forced to leave their home, their job and possibly their family as well. Part of it is preventing any further damages due to climate change and working on equal opportunities, enabling children from all around the world to get high level education and fairly paid jobs without the need to move.

The next stage is the transit itself. For some people it's as easy as jumping into a plane and hopping of in their destination. For others, the process involves risking their life in a small boat, walking and thus only taking few of their belongings. Among them are also people holding their breath everytime they get close to a border, afraid all the danger was for nothing and getting deported to their origin. Border control is a significant challenge posed by migration. How can we ensure the freedom of movement and prevent crimes like human trafficking at the same time? Controlled borders ease the search for criminals and possible victims. Some international corporations like the African Union already put programs in place to make the passage of borders easier dealing with those questions.

After entering the country of destination, the journey doesn't end for most migrants. Migrants often face precarious conditions in the country of their destination. If the status of the migration is not completed, working permits are really limited. In addition to the fear of being deported, people without a regular job and regular pay have little to no opportunities to be part of the new country.

Migration and borders lead to conflicts, conflicts about beliefs and identity as well as about property. It's also important to consider the past, especially in countries with colonialistic backgrounds leading to unnatural borders. Considering many different problems connected to borders and the way they are enforced opens the dialog for the development of borders. How will they impact humans in the future?

Now it is our turn to map the future.







Dresscode



You can find the 8th edition of the MUNOL Rules of Procedure including the Dress Code here! Any participant of MUNOL is to be suitably dressed, wearing either long trousers in combination with a jacket, shirt and tie or a trouser-suit, a dress or a coat/blazer in combination with a skirt. Dresses and shirts must have an appropriate neckline.

Non-compliance with the dress code may lead to a reprehension and is to be corrected for the further proceedings of the conference

Dress code checks maybe done by the Secretaries-General, the Conference Management or the Chair of the forum the delegate attends.

Always wear your badge everywhere! It's your card of identification and without it you can't get into the locations!

Make sure that your shirt has am appropriate neckline. Also don't forget your tie!

Trousers should be long enough to cover your entire leg. If you want to wear a skirt, it shouldn't be shorter than one hand (horizontal) above your knee.

Formal shoes (dress shoes, high heels, etc.) are required.

Role of a Delegate

For the proper simulation of the United Nations, it is vital that all students, acting as a delegate, take their duties and responsibilities very seriously. Delegates are to conduct themselves as diplomats at all times. This involves a proper code of conduct but first and foremost compliance with the official MUNOL Rules of Procedure and the acceptance of the Chairs and the Executive Staff as the major authority. A conference at the scale of MUNOL can only work efficiently if all members involved cherish the level of professionalism and proficiency.

It is needless to say that the proper conduct of a delegate demands punctuality. Not being present at specific times can lead to an interruption of the whole organisation. Unpunctuality will normally result in punitive measures decided upon by the Chairs or the Executive Staff.


